
Fraternal Year Elections Looming

We need EVERYONE'S participation to assist in the sale. Remember, spouses and teenagers can help as well and are most WELCOME.



19th Annual Lenten Fish Fry Sets New Record!


We finished this year's Fish Fry season with 357 more meals than last year, beating our record, set in 2014, of 8,436 for Lent by serving 8,779 total meals this year! Now 9,000 is just around the corner!

While we never broke our single night record of 1,422, we gave it a scare with 1,300 plus on five nights. Thanks to all our volunteers for another record series of events. This constant increase in volume helps us keep our prices constant every year.

Our Parish Bingo Accountant, Brother Ralph O'Connor, reported that the March 17th Bingo event had a smaller crowd of 87 players including 3 council widows who play free with the council paying their fee. Bingo sales were \$1,321 with prizes awarded of \$900 yielding gross \$421 (before payments of 7% sales tax and Bingo supplies cost). Profit of 50/50 raffle added \$100. Food donations were \$193 and drink income was \$150.

Join Our Unique Council Acolyte Ministry



For twenty years, our All Saints Council has been providing altar servers for every parish funeral and some special Mass events. Instituted by former pastor Monsignor Kiernan in the late 1990's, he asked the Knights if they could serve funeral Masses in lieu of youngsters who were hard to schedule on school days, weekends, and on short notice for funerals. Our acolyte program with up to seventy participants was the eager response. We haven't missed a funeral since. There are about 50 deaths per year at All Saints. We know of no other council in the world with such a ministry.

Organized into five acolyte teams under five team leaders, we rotate funerals as they occur among the five teams under Acolyte Director, Brother Norb Braza. Each member provides a navy blue blazer, medium grey slacks, white shirt, and black shoes. The council provides a KofC tie to finish the attractive "uniform".

Because some of our acolyte team members have passed or moved away, we would like to add about a dozen new members across the five teams. Training is provided and you should only have to serve about one funeral per month. Being on God's altar is a privilege rather than an obligation. If you were once a young altar server you can appreciate this. If you were never an altar server, you can begin to appreciate the pride of ceremonial participation. Burying the dead is a work of mercy.

A full funeral acolyte team can consist of a cross bearer, two candle bearers, a water and a wine bearer, and an incense bearer. When six knights are not available, a team of four knights is sufficient. People who attend funerals at All Saints are always impressed by the mature solemnity of the men on the altar. Our brother, Bernie Sotola, provides the vocals at these funerals and is yet another participant in a matching uniform.



Sad Farewell to Fr. Joseph Peek



Father Joseph Michael Peek ("Father Joe") was born on 9 August 1965, in Corpus Christi, Texas.

He survived a miraculous birth in dire condition; he was seven weeks early, black from lack of oxygen, and baptized by the doctor because of danger of death.

After a brief stop in Amityville, NY, he and his soon-to-be ten siblings grew up in a bustling Irish Catholic family in the Northlake area of Atlanta. At home, daily reminders of his family's Catholic faithsurrounded Father Joe. A five-foot tall crucifix hung in the family's living room behind a statue of Our Lady of Fatima, before which the family would pray the

rosary nightly. His parents, Mary and Joseph Peek, emphasized the importance of serving others, and encouraged each of their children to serve their parish and to live their faith on a daily basis.

As a child, Father Joe began his service to his church as an altar server at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church. Even at a young age, Father Joe developed a reputation for looking out for outcasts, long before bullying became such a widespread topic of concern. He was the one who noticed the kid sitting alone at the cafeteria table or soccer field and befriended them. As a soccer referee, he had the reputation for throwing a disruptive player out of a game for misconduct; however, once the game was over, he sought out the player he had removed from the game and scrimmaged with him. He taught himself magic tricks to allow him to entertain, mesmerize, and teach both young and old alike.

Father Joe's journey to priesthood was not a direct one. After graduating from Lakeside High School in DeKalb County (class of 1983), he attended the Georgia Institute of Technology on a Naval ROTC scholarship.

He entered the Navy in the late 1980s and served three years as a Search & Rescue swimmer, and anti-submarine air crewman, dipping sonar on board an SH-63 heli-copter. He also worked as a substitute teacher and a waiter at Outback Steakhouse.

But he kept feeling a pull toward the priesthood and decided to go to seminary with the hopes of becoming a Navy chaplain. He then spent three years with the Oblates of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Boston, attending St. John's Seminary. Coming back to diocesan life, he spent two years at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary in Pennsylvania, and finished up his last two years at Mount Saint Mary's Seminary in Maryland.

And then, one day in 2002, Father Joe, who as a Navy rescue swimmer was known for his physical endurance and strength, couldn't reach the top of a hill during his daily run at seminary, where he regularly "tagged" Jesus on the cross.

In February 2002, just months shy of his ordination, Father Joe was diagnosed with chronic myelogenous leukemia. This was the beginning of years and years of severe pain, and ever-so-slow improvements, mixed with setbacks. Despite his diagnosis, he completed his studies and was ordained to the priesthood on June 22, 2002, by Archbishop John F. Donoghue. In October 2003, Father Joe received a bone marrow transplant from his sister Kathleen, and while doctors believed the transplant effectively cured Father Joe of the cancer, the procedure created a new series of life-threatening health concerns.

Suffering from what is known as "graft-versus-host disease," the new immune system attacked Father Joe's body. The illness ravaged his organs one-by-one, ultimately affecting his flesh-beginning with his back, always invisible to the public, but massive and raw, and often irritated by hugs he never mentioned were an affliction.

Over time, the wounds extended from his face and neck to his feet, challenging his life-long ambition of serving as a priest. Open wounds scarred more than 70% of his body, including the soles of his feet. The sores on his body made a good night's sleep elusive as lying in one spot for a couple of hours resulted in excruciating pain for Father Joe. His bandages on his wounds had to be changed three times a week, and even then several times he contracted MRSA. In 2008, he became septic and almost died. Despite his life threatening illness, Father Joe asked for and received parish assignments at St. Catherine of Siena, Kennesaw; Sts. Peter & Paul Parish, Decatur; Mary Our Queen, Norcross; and All Saints Church, Dunwoody.

However, his parish assignments, while important to Father Joe, became a small part of his ministry as a priest. Father Joe believed that as a priest he needed to be a visible presence of Christ to others. More importantly, Father Joe believed his experience as a patient put him in a special category of priests, and he felt a need to minister to fellow patients at Emory University's Winship Cancer Institute and others within Atlanta's Catholic community.

Father Joe became the spiritual advisor to the sickest of the sick. He would regularly visit with patients in the hospital--even though such visits threatened his own health, since his body was covered with open wounds that left him susceptible to infections. He also developed a large on-line ministry, which he would attend to as much as his strength and health would allow. In 2012, he developed squamous cell carcinoma, which turned several of his wounds into growing lesions.

Father Joe had a few procedures to remove these lesions, but eventually, they spread to his lymph nodes. He was told by his doctors in December 2014 that there was nothing more they could do. On March 14, 2016, Father Joe, surrounded by the songs and prayers his parents and siblings, drew his last breath, completed his life on earth, and began his eternal life with Christ. Father Joseph Peek is survived by his parents, Mary and Joseph of Atlanta, his ten siblings, and his thirty-nine nieces and nephews.

The Wake and Viewing was held all night on Thursday, March 17, starting at 7pm at All Saints Catholic Church, where Father Joe was in residence: 2443 Mount Vernon Road, Atlanta, GA 30338.

The Funeral Mass was celebrated by Archbishop Wilton D. Gregory at All Saints Catholic Church on Friday, March 18, at 11am. Fr. Kevin Peek, the brother of Fr. Joe, was the homilist. A reception followed in the parish social hall.

Father Joe's burial was at Georgia National Cemetery, 1080 Veterans Cemetery Road, Canton, GA 30114 on Monday, March 21, at 11:30 am.

Sister Mother Mary Angelica Passes

HANCEVILLE, Alabama — Mother Mary Angelica, a folksy Roman Catholic nun who used a monastery garage to begin a television ministry that grew into a global religious media empire, has died. She was 92.

Known to millions of viewers simply as "Mother Angelica," the founder of the Eternal Word Television Network died Easter Sunday at the rural monastery where she lived about 45 miles north of Birmingham, according to EWTN Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Michael P. Warsaw.

"Mother has always, and will always, personify EWTN, the Network which she founded. In the face of sickness and long-suffering trials, Mother's example of joy and prayerful perseverance exemplified the Franciscan spirit she held so dear. We thank God for Mother Angelica and for the gift of her extraordinary life," Warsaw said in a news release late Sunday.

Mother Angelica had been in declining health since suffering a severe cerebral hemorrhage on Christmas

Eve 2001. She never regained her full speaking ability and had other, less-severe strokes through the years.

Bedridden for months, Mother Angelica was placed on a feeding tube this fall as her health slowly declined, fellow nuns at Our Lady of the Angels Monastery said in an announcement released in November.

Alabama Gov. Robert Bentley said in a statement Sunday that Mother Angelica will live on forever in the hearts of those touched by her sermons.
