The 2015 KofC Vidalia Onion Sale is now history, and once again our All Saints Council led the way by selling more than 500 10-pound bags of Vidalia Onions and raising over \$2,500 for our charities. We are blessed to have a great Council that provided over 70 volunteers to SELL onions on the weekend of May 2-3.

Sales Manager, Dean Trantow, announced that this year we had 3 "IRON MEN" who worked more than 5 masses - Tom Burleigh, Wiley Maloof and Dave Mason. Thanks to ALL who volunteered.

As part of this sale, Big Onion John Buchholz coordinates the onion orders/delivery for 11 other Councils in the Atlanta Metro area. This year the other 11 Councils who participated and the number of bags sold were:

A couple of noteworthy contributions were the Onion Pies made by Joey Fuentes and the various Onion pastry snacks made by Karleen Buchholz. Handing out samples of *"how you can use the onions"* really helped create some excitement for our sale.

We would not be able to handle this coordination without the help of PGK Ed Krise and his CourierSouth team of drivers. We had <u>3,000</u> bags of onions delivered to his warehouse, and then they re-palletized them for the various Councils. Ed arranges for all the local deliveries over a 2 day period. Everything was ON TIME! Thanks, Ed.

With the onions costing about \$5 per 10-pound bag, and being sold for \$10, the \$5 profit means that over \$15,000 was raised by all the Councils for their charities. We are proud to be able to help make this record possible.



# **Marklein Cycles for Cristo Rey High**



Our Sir Knight Dick Marklein has opted to cycle 3,872 miles across America to raise \$30,000 for <u>Cristo Rey Atlanta</u>, the new Jesuit High School. Our council brother, Deacon Bill Garrett, is the president of the school.

His cycling adventure begins May 31st in San Francisco and ends July 21st in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. He will be personally funding all the expenses associated with the trip with all monies raised benefiting Christo Rey science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programs.

Other riders will accompany him, but he will be the only one riding for Cristo Rey. Donations are tax deductible and are already streaming in. The council has voted to donate \$500 at the March meeting.

### Watters Assembly Presents Chalices to New Priests

Our Fourth Degree Fr. Charles J. Watters Assembly 2688 scheduled the presentation of two memorial chalices to newly-ordained priests in May. Our Stan Wasowski, the Faithful Navigator of the Assembly, was the official presenter. Honor guards at the Masses made the ceremonies special.

The Watters Assembly honors deceased Sir Knights by purchasing and engraving their names on chalices to be remembered at every future Mass said by the recipient. Each recipient's name and the Assembly name are also engraved thereon. Standard chalices are given to chosen recipients who do not travel to remote locations. Travelling Mass kits are given to priests who work in remote areas. Up to three Sir Knight names are engraved on a standard-size chalice, while the smaller travelling chalice as part of a complete Mass kit can hold only two member names.

The large number of recent Assembly deaths necessitated two chalices with one more on order:

At the Wednesday, May 27th, All Saints Mass at 7 PM, Father Michael Garcia was presented a standard Chalice with his name and that of three deceased brothers (Marcus Carroll, Edward J. Qualters, and Tom E. Mix.

Fr. Michael Garcia, 26, is a native Miamian whose home parish is St. Agatha in Miami.. He had been serving at Immaculate Conception, Hialeah Fl. as a deacon this past year. Fr. Michael is the son of Cuban exiles and the elder of two brothers whose family moved to Atlanta when he started high school.

He was ordained a deacon on September 6, 2014 and just recently ordained a priest on February 14, 2015 by Bishop Gregory Hartmeyer, OFM Conventual.

Friar Gabriel is currently chaplain at Our Lady of Mercy High School in Fayetteville, GA. In addition he assists at the Franciscan parish of St. Philip Benizi on weekends.

### **Interesting Facts**

#### A SHOT OF WHISKEY

In the old West a .45 cartridge for a six-gun cost 12 cents, so did a glass of whiskey. If a cowhand was low on cash, he would often give the bartender a cartridge in exchange for a drink. This became known as a "shot" of whiskey.

#### THE WHOLE NINE YARDS

American fighter planes in WW2 had machine guns that were fed by a belt of cartridges. The average plane held belts that were 27 feet (9 yards) long. If the pilot used up all his ammo, he was said to have given it the whole nine yards.

#### **BUYING THE FARM**

This is synonymous with dying. During WW1 soldiers were given life insurance policies worth \$5,000. This was about the price of an average farm, so if you died you "bought the farm" for your survivors.

#### IRON CLAD CONTRACT

This came about from the ironclad ships of the Civil War. Something so strong it could not be broken.

#### PASSING THE BUCK / THE BUCK STOPS HERE

Most men in the early west carried a jack knife made by the Buck knife company. When playing poker it was common to place one of these Buck knives in front of the dealer, so that everyone knew who he was. When it was time for a new dealer, the deck of cards and the knife were given to the new dealer. If this person didn't want to deal, he would "pass the buck" to the next player. If that player accepted, then "the buck stopped there".

#### RIFF RAFF

The Mississippi River was the main way of traveling from north to south. Riverboats carried passengers and freight but they were expensive, so most people used rafts. Everything had the right of way over rafts which were considered cheap. The steering oar on the rafts was called a "riff" and this transposed into riff-raff, meaning low class.

#### <u>COBWEB</u>

The Old English word for "spider" was "cob", hence a cob's web.

#### SHIP STATE ROOMS

Traveling by steamboat was considered the height of comfort. Passenger cabins on the boats were not numbered. Instead they were named after states. To this day cabins on ships are called staterooms.

#### SLEEP TIGHT

Early beds were made with a wooden frame. Ropes were tied across the frame in a criss-cross pattern. A straw mattress was then put on top of the ropes. Over time the ropes stretched, causing the bed to sag. The owner would then tighten the ropes to get a better night's sleep.

#### OVER A BARREL

In the days before CPR a drowning victim would be placed face down over a barrel and the barrel would be rolled back and forth in an effort to empty the lungs of water. It was rarely effective. If you are over a barrel you are in deep trouble.

#### BARGE IN

Heavy freight was moved along the Mississippi in large barges pushed by steamboats. These were hard to control and would sometimes swing into piers or other boats. People would say they "barged in".

#### **HOGWASH**

Steamboats carried both people and animals. Since pigs smelled so bad, they would be washed before being put on board. The mud and other filth that was washed off was considered useless "hog wash".

#### **CURFEW**

The word "curfew" comes from the French phrase "couvre-feu", which means "cover the fire". It was used to describe the time of blowing out all lamps and candles. It was later adopted into Middle English as "curfeu", which later became the modern "curfew". In the early American colonies homes had no real fireplaces, so a fire was built in the center of the room. In order to make sure a fire did not get out of control during the night, it was required that, by an agreed upon time, all fires would be covered with a clay pot called — a "curfew".

#### **BARRELS OF OIL**

When the first oil wells were drilled, they had made no provision for storing the liquid, so they used water barrels. That is why, to this day, we speak of barrels of oil rather than gallons.

#### HOT OFF THE PRESS

As the paper goes through the rotary printing press, friction causes it to heat up. Therefore, if you grab the paper right off the press, it's hot. The expression means to get immediate information.

### Namesake of Our 4th Degree Watters Assembly



Since the Civil War, five American chaplains have been awarded the Medal of Honor:

- Lt. Comdr. Joseph Timothy O'Callahan U.S. Navy (World War II)
- Capt. Emil J. Kapaun
   U.S. Army (Korean War)
- Lt. Vincent Robert Capodanno
- U.S. Navy (Vietnam War)

- Maj. Charles Joseph Watters U.S. Army (Victnam War)
- Capt. Angelo J. Liteky U.S. Army (Vietnam War)

Every one of them was a Catholic priest, and two have causes for beatification (Kapaun in the Korean War; Capodanno in the Vietnam War).

These are the three chaplains who were awarded the MOH as a result of their actions in Vietnam in 1967.



#### Charles J. Watters

CH (MAJ) USA

Battle of Dak To, Republic of Vietnam November 19, 1967 A Catholic priest, he was posthumously award

A Catholic priest, he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for bravery exhibited while rescuing wounded men in the Vietnam War, specifically the Battle of Dalt To. He was killed in the battle in a friendly fire incident when a 500-pound bomb was dropped on American paratroopers near the triage area where he was working.

#### MAJOR CHARLES JOSEPH WATTERS

#### United States Army

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Chaplain Watters distinguished himself during an assault in the vicinity of Dak To. Chaplain Watters was moving with one of the companies when it engaged a heavily armed enemy battalion. As the battle raged and the casualties mounted, Chaplain Watters, with complete disregard for his safety, rushed forward to the line of contact. Unarmed and completely exposed, he moved among, as well as in front of the advancing troops, giving aid to the wounded, assisting in their evacuation, giving words of encouragement, and administering the last rites to the dying. When a wounded paratrooper was standing in shock in front of the assaulting forces, Chaplain Watters ran forward, picked the man up on his shoulders and carried him to safety. As the troopers hattled to the first enemy entrenchment, Chaplain Watters ran through the intense enemy fire to the front of the entrenchment to aid a fallen comrade. A short time later, the paratroopers pulled back in preparation for a second assault. Chaplain Watters exposed himself to both friendly and enemy fire between the two forces in order to recover two wounded soldiers. Later, when the battalion was forced to pull back into a perimeter, Chaplain Watters noticed that several wounded soldiers were lying outside the newly formed perimeter. Without hesitation and ignoring attempts to restrain him, Chaplain Watters left the perimeter three times in the face of small arms, automatic weapons, and mortar fire to earry and to assist the injured troopers to safety. Satisfied that all of the wounded were inside the perimeter, he began aiding the medics ... applying field bandages to open wounds, obtaining and serving food and water, giving spiritual and mental strength and comfort. During his ministering, he moved out to the penmeter from position to position redistributing food and water, and tending to the needs of his men. Chaplain Watters was giving aid to the wounded when he himself was mortally wounded. Chaptain Watters' unyielding perseverance and selfless devotion to his comrades was in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Army.

If you ever wondered why our 4th degree members are in the Fr. Charles J. Watters Assembly, here is the namesake's biography. Above are the names of five Catholic chaplains who hold the Congressional Medal of Honor. The St. Brigid Sir Knights broke off from the Watters Assembly to form the new Joseph O'Callahan Assembly and Vincent Capodanno is remembered in prayers for our Father Michael Peek. 19
