Grand Knight's Report

Brothers:

I'm not sure Council 11402 has ever had a two week stretch like this.

On February 26 we hosted a first-degree exemplification in which we welcomed six new brothers to the council. It was yet another near flawless effort by our award-winning degree team, with about 20 observers in attendance to support our newest members. A big "thank you" to Ernie Spencer's crew for a job well done.

Two nights later, we hosted our first pay-for-play Bingo game in the Social Hall. It could not have gone better! More than 50 players took part, enjoying the Bingo as well as Dominic Palermo's home-made meatballs! I cannot wait until later this month when we unveil our state-of-the-art Bingo equipment and invite the parish to join the fun. Dominic – you are the man!

Two nights later, it was our time to shine in front of family and friends with our practice Fish Fry – and shine we did! We served a trial-run record of 337 meals, operating like a well-oiled machine. For the first time in Fish Fry history we accepted credit card payments, and there were no hiccups. Please give a big pat on the back to BJ Van Gundy for making this possible.

In an ongoing effort to improve the Fish Fry experience, we experimented with "fresh-catch" frozen salmon, asking our patrons to fill out a survey to see if they preferred it to the fresh salmon we've served in the past. The results reveal that our tried-and-true fresh salmon remains the fish of choice.

On the same night of the practice Fish Fry, McGivney Hall hosted the parish's Friday Movie Night. Kudos to Brian Kler for making the smooth transition from the Social Hall (which is the usual venue, but was not available).

On Tuesday evening we will host our March

business meeting. And if this meeting is like the past few, you'd better come early to get a seat! The meetings have been standing-room-only since the start of the year – thanks to everyone for their contributions.

On Ash Wednesday, the Fish Fry goes "live" to the parish and community. We are expecting to serve about 700 meals. We will unveil a third serving line in the kitchen to not only provide faster service for to-go orders, but to speed-up delivery time of meals in general. Bob Mitchell put in countless hours to make this possible, relying on the electrical expertise of Brother Steve Strong.

While Ash Wednesday is our official tip-off for the Fish Fry, Friday evening is when we'll be running-on-all-cylinders. We anticipate serving approximately 1,000 meals.

By the way, despite rising food costs, we have not increased our prices. Yes, we want to earn as much money as possible for our deserving charities, but the Fish Fry is about fellowship and community. No one knows that better than the Bull, Ray Gustin, now 80-years old and still going strong. Ray continues to be the backbone of the Fish Fry. Ray – we couldn't do it without you!

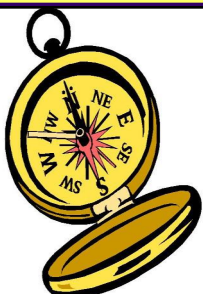

Maloofs Make History at Famous Tavern

Chickens come home to roost at famous tavern

Rooftop coop provides fresh eggs for many dishes at Manuel's.

Sometime in November, residents in Poncey-Highland began to take notice of an odd looking square structure on the roof of Manuel's Tavern, the 58-year-old Atlanta institution.

It was a pale green square thing. No one was exactly sure what it was.

Dear Friends of Manuel's: Back in mid-December, I posted that Manuel's had a surprise coming in 2014.

For several years I have thought about building a rooftop chicken coop at Manuel's. Yes, chickens living on Manuel's roof. But hearing many words of advice against it, I reluctantly set the idea aside. For a while. ...

to be a two-year research project about chickens, chicken coops and rooftops. And then, eight months ago, things moved from research and planning to action. ...

The Monday before Thanksgiving, all the chickens came home to Manuel's. The day after Thanksgiving I walked into the hen house and witnessed the laying of the first egg.

Those eggs will end up on the menu, as fresh as they come.

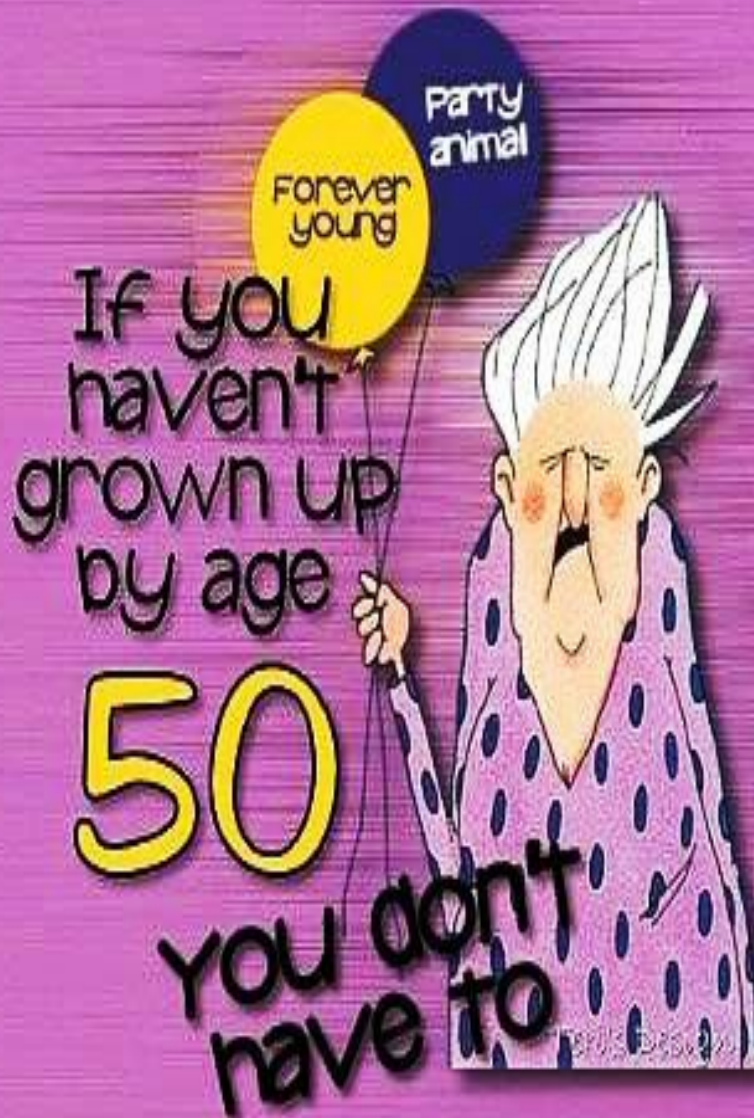

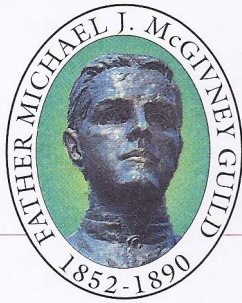

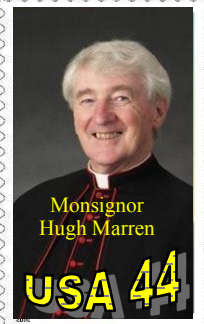
