This very successful display of Council involvement was made possible by alerting the membership with the combination of voice mail, an email from Church Director Al Garofalo, and then a follow-up email from District Deputy Guy Stryker.

Annual "Altar Server Recognition Outing" Held



Taking a page out of a Macy's front window, our Youth Director Mark Moots set up a display in the church vestibule to bring attention to both the altar server organization and the Knights of Columbus outing that we were to hold for their benefit.

Moots set up a display of an altar server cassock, surplus, and sash to bring attention to the need for additional servers, along with a sign stating the fact that boys and girls from the third grade and up are eligible.

While it may have been hot as Hades outside, 29 fun-loving altar servers scampered up the walls of *Atlanta Rocks!* on Saturday, August 18th. They were "*Climbing for the Lord!*" following the successful organizational meeting conducted by Monsignor, who signed eight new servers. Then with the expert cassock-fitting work done by Sir Knight Doug Birkbeck, ensuring that the All Saints Altar Servers would always be the finest-looking around, they headed for their climbing adventure.

The kids scaled numerous walls 25 or so feet up, tethered and supervised by the onsite staff. (When you see them climbing sideways and scurrying along the walls, you just have to wonder.) After many challenging climbs, the kids shared cookies and drinks while waiting to



Flashback Our Lady, Queen of the Knights Chapel

Hidden in plain sight in the vestibule of All Saints Church is an interesting room with a small sign reading *“Our Lady, Queen of the Knights Chapel.”* In a previous life, it was a gift shop, but its ultimate destiny was to become a chapel.

In late 1998, Monsignor Kiernan mentioned to All Saints Grand Knight George Novac that he would like to have a chapel similar to one that he had admired at Holy Spirit Parish. Brother Novac took our home-building Brother, Sam Portis, with him, and they checked out the Holy Spirit Chapel. They let Monsignor know that it would not be a problem, because it was constructed of American Cherry “judges paneling” with a light stain and lacquer found in many higher level homes.

It was decided that the gift shop would be converted, that the Knights would donate the labor and the room materials, and the church would pay for the air conditioning and electrical modifications. Novac would handle the administrative issues, Portis would handle the construction, and they took turns overseeing subcontractors as schedules permitted.

At this point, David Boring, the sales manager of the Pierce and Pierce Mill Works Company on Buford Highway, was contracted by Portis to supply the wood. (*Boring was a Catholic and eager to help. Novac and Portis eventually persuaded Boring to become a Knight, and he later even helped start the Blue Ridge Council in North Georgia.*) Portis then contacted his trim man to design the paneling. Monsignor was shown the raw product samples at the mill supplier and approved the final design and “look” he wanted.


The project took about a month and went extremely well except for some heating/air conditioning problems. Another Knight, Robert Greene, volunteered his expertise with carpeting from his decorating business and also chose the colors. At that point, the question of furniture came up.

It was decided that they would start with twelve kneeler/chairs named in honor of the twelve apostles. That brought yet another Knight into the picture. Dick Holcomb (now with St. Brigid Council) was a neighbor of Sam Portis and sold that type of furniture. After some cajoling by Portis, he agreed to sell the kneeler/chairs at a discount to the church. Portis, Novac, and Holcomb generously each paid personally for one unit and nine other parishioners bought one also. The dedication plaques are on the chairs still.

The chapel was dedicated and blessed by Archbishop Donoghue and Monsignor on Feb. 8, 1999. Today it is used for smaller baptisms, benedictions, prayer and silent meditation, and other limited functions. With the twelve apostle chairs and a few others, the room should only accommodate about 15 people maximum.

Using the people, techniques, and talents that were so successful on the chapel project, the Knights then turned their efforts toward converting the cluttered storage area in the basement under the Kiernan Scout Hut into the present beautiful McGivney Hall, named after Fr. Michael J. McGivney who founded the **Knights of Columbus** in 1882. Thus, two very underserved areas became very functional additions to the parish because of this hard-working organization.





The tuxedos are individually purchased as part of the exemplification ceremony for the Fourth Degree.

We will be asking for more of our Sir Knights to partake in this 125-year-old tradition, and lend the pomp, dignity, and color to the ceremonies that benefit so well from it. This is one of the most visible Catholic ministries in the world.

September Social Meeting — Spotlight on Men's Health



Doctor Nikhil L. Shah DO, MPH

Our special September 18th speaker, Dr. Nikhil L. Shah, currently serves as the Director of Minimally Invasive and Robotic Urology at Saint Joseph's Hospital of Atlanta. He trained at the Vattikuti Urology Institute under Dr. Mani Menon.

During his training, Dr. Shah completed a National Institute of Health/ National Institute of Diabetes and Kidney Urologist-Scientist Research Fellowship with Dr. Martin Sanda at the University of Michigan. In addition, he earned a Masters Degree in Health Management and Policy at the University of Michigan's School of Public Health.

Dr. Shah serves as a researcher and clinician. He acts as a proctor for robotic surgery and has traveled internationally to present papers and teach robotic surgery.

In addition, he has played an active role in medical leadership and policy related issues with the American Medical Association (AMA) and the American Urologic Association (AUA). He continues to remain active and currently serves on the AMA's Coding and Reimbursement Committee.

Throughout his training, Dr. Shah developed patient and spouse prostate cancer support groups in Detroit and Ann Arbor, Michigan. In addition, he has received federal funding to investigate patient and spouse interactions and satisfaction with prostate cancer treatment. He is continuing his clinical research efforts at Saint Joseph Hospital in Atlanta and maintains an active role in local, national and international medical relief organizations for underserved people.

He is an expert on major diseases affecting men, such as cardiovascular disease, cancer, stroke, alcoholism, drug abuse and psychiatric disorders are just a few entities that can be examined and addressed. In addition, examining conditions surrounding aging will be especially important with our baby boomers and the increasing age of America's population. Such conditions are osteoporosis, arthritis, the effects of declines in testosterone and sexual function as well as prostate disease and cancer. Workplace stress and personal psychosocial issues also play an important role for many men.

Don't pass up this opportunity to chat in public or private with this very special man.

Passed and Pending Council Benevolence Requests

At the July meeting, these charity requests were discussed and/or voted by the membership:

A high school graduation gift of \$250 was voted for Joey Scranton, son of deceased Sir Knight Brad Scranton. Joey is a special needs student and the gift was in memory of his father—a founder of our Council who passed away in 2003.

A donation of \$500 was voted to the Southern Catholic College Scholarship Fund. This amount fulfills the request made by the KoC Georgia State Council that all councils consider donating about \$2 per member to this fund in order to raise \$25,000 this year. It was noted that All Saints officers are considering holding a special fund raising event for Southern Catholic later in the fiscal year.

Sir Knight Kirby Baden proposed that the Council consider a sponsorship of \$1,000 for the Elaine Clark Benefit Golf Tournament. This amount would allow our members a playing discount, would allow Council banners and signage in the clubhouse, and would still benefit the Elaine Clark Center with \$1,000. There was some discussion as to general perception of donating in this fashion.

Because this amount is over \$500, it must be passed by the Charity Committee, proposed to the membership at the September business meeting, then publicized in the October newsletter, and then put to a final vote at the October business meeting. The tournament is October 5th. It was noted that such sponsorship arrangements are not uncommon among the Knights or other organizations.

Atlanta Fourth Degree to be Held on October 13th

On Saturday October 13th, a Fourth Degree Exemplification will be held at 10 AM at the Atlanta Airport Marriott Hotel. It is a grandiose affair with hundreds of candidates in black tuxedos and over a hundred honor guards in regalia. It is not something you will easily forget. This is the culmination of Father McGivney's dream for a huge, active organization that can make a difference in society. Unsuspecting onlookers staying at the hotel are usually in shock and awe—and especially if they are non-Catholics who are not familiar with the Knights of Columbus.

The All Saints Council has about 75 third degree members. There is no reason that we can not field a huge contingent of candidates, spouses, and officer observers to make this a big Council event. Our sister councils in the Watters Assembly always field sizeable groups and they all have less members. For that reason, all 3rd degree members will be alerted. Because this is a fourth degree event, our Fr. Watters Assembly provides the coordination rather than our Council.

This event will not be without costs—a tuxedo may have to be purchased, there are costs for the hotel ballroom rental, the cocktail reception, the Spouses' Wine & Cheese during our exemplification, a group Mass, and a seated dinner later. Don't plan to cut the grass this day, it is an all-day affair. It will leave a favorable, lasting impression on candidates.

Step 1: Obtain a Form 4 to register for the ceremony. These are available at McGivney. Fill one out and return it to us.

Step 2: Get a regular black tuxedo (no tails) if you don't already own one. You will need a plain white tuxedo dress shirt (no frilly lace, no upward wing collar), a black cummerbund (no vest), studs and cuff links, a black bow tie, and shined dress shoes. We suggest purchase for about \$260, rather than rental over \$100. Fourth degree Sir Knights often use tuxedos for other Assembly formal events or optional Color Corps duty. (If you ever go on an ocean cruise, they also have a formal captain's tux dress-up night.) You will be presented a ceremonial baldric during the event (a colorful diagonal K of C sash that goes across your chest.)

Tuxedos may be purchased anywhere. A good local source is located in the new huge Perimeter Place shopping center across from Perimeter Mall. The store below is just off the central car roundabout circle.

Step 3: Pay the other event costs to Bob Heald of our council (who is also the comptroller of the Watters Assembly.) Some, like the Spouse's Wine & Cheese and the formal dinner, are optional. These were typical costs last year: Candidate fee \$70, Banquet \$42 (non-candidate), Ladies Wine & Cheese \$25. Buffet after degree \$15 each. (Candidate fee includes, one Banquet ticket, Fourth Degree lapel pin, Social Baldric, and Degree Certificate.) There will be a complimentary Hospitality Suite available as well.

Join the group of 75 fourth degree Sir Knights in our Council and become part of this elite group of Catholic men who make a difference in our parish, our Church, our community, and our nation. Don't wait until next year.


