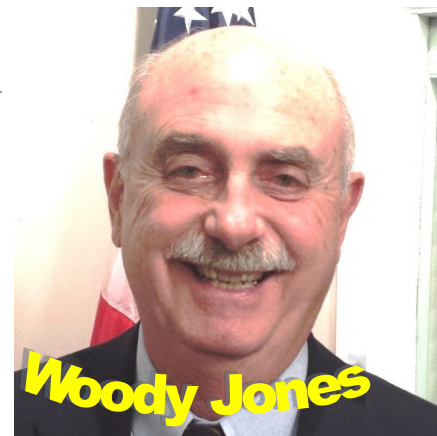

Faith in Action is the new umbrella program covering all Supreme Council-recommended programs. It replaces Surge With Service which began in 1971. Faith in Action is simpler for councils, and it makes clear the newly-defined council roles and responsibilities. It offers a stronger call to action, better inspiring Knights to lead their families and parishes in quality, faith-filled family programs.

The new model takes its inspiration from the Domestic Church program, which focuses on creating dynamic parish-based councils. You will note that standalone Knight Halls are being abandoned with the intent of integrating councils into parish life. Likewise, spiritual renewal is at the center of the new model, especially the renewal of family, council, and parish life.

It is divided into four categories of programs: **Faith, Family, Community, and Life.** The old model had six. Nothing is lost, but past activities have been compressed under only four categories with featured programs and required programs now identified within each.

The four categories represent our main priorities as an Order: the primary goal is to strengthen our men and their families in the Catholic **faith**. We also emphasize the vital role that a devout and loyal **family** plays in a modern society. Additionally, a critical part of our mission as Knights is to spread a spirit of **community**. Finally, both as Knights of Columbus and followers of Christ, we have an obligation “to be committed to the defense of **life** in all its stages and in every condition” (St. John Paul II).

A council may develop and conduct any program that makes a difference in their parish or community. However, the Supreme Council does recommend 32 programs—eight in each category.

A council must earn a total of 16 program credits and complete these four required programs: **Spiritual Reflection Program, Consecration to the Holy Family, Helping Hands, and Novena for Life.** A completed recommended program earns one program credit, while a featured program earns two. Each of these four required programs fall into a different one of the four categories and counts one. (Columbian Squires is no longer a recommended program.)

The *Columbian Award Application* (#SP-7) will be updated to reflect these new requirements. (Note: *The Columbian Award* plus other insurance criteria are components of the *Star Council Award*.)

New K of C Programs

The Supreme Council has introduced nine new programs within the Faith in Action model. Complementing featured programs — e.g., the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP), Food For Families and the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative, to name a few — as well as other existing K of C initiatives, this brings the total number of recommended programs to 32 (eight in each category).



FAITH

Spiritual Reflection Program

Creating fraternal opportunities for prayer and reflection, such as retreats, produces spiritually vibrant councils. Under the guidance of their chaplain, councils can attend a retreat or day of reflection together, or they can hold low-cost retreats of their own. Such events might be open only to council members or men of the parish — or to entire families.

Holy Hour

Eucharistic adoration deepens our personal relationship with Christ. Councils can organize their Holy Hours in a variety of ways and incorporate things such as the sacrament of reconciliation and prayer for particular intentions. A K of C Holy Hour prepared for men of the parish could also include a reflection, communal rosary, prayers for the intercession of Father McGivney or St. Joseph, and other components decided by the council.

Sacramental Gifts

The sacraments are milestone events in the lives of Catholic families. Councils can support parish families at these pivotal moments by praying for recipients of the sacraments and by offering

them specific gifts, such as rosaries or books, to mark the significance of occasions such as baptism, first Communion, confirmation and marriage.



FAMILY

Family Prayer Night

Catholics often struggle to find opportunities to socialize and/or pray together with other faith-filled Catholic families. Family Prayer Night is an opportunity for council members, their families and the whole parish community to come together for an evening of prayer, dinner and fellowship.

Good Friday Family Promotion

Knights are encouraged to attend Good Friday liturgies with their families and to work with their pastors to foster increased parish involvement, promoting a better understanding of the centrality of Holy Week to our Catholic faith. Councils will also work to educate their parishes about the plight of persecuted Christians in the Holy Land and elsewhere.



COMMUNITY

Helping Hands

Inspired by Father McGivney's witness of charity for widows and orphans, this program is designed to build upon the important work many councils already do to care for disadvantaged members of our communities. All councils are called to aid those in most need in their community through any number of activities, such as serving at or running a soup kitchen or repairing the facilities of a local service organization.



LIFE

Mass for People with Special Needs

Councils are called to welcome individuals or families who might not

regularly attend scheduled Masses due to special needs resulting from physical, emotional, mental or cognitive conditions. Annually, a council will sponsor a Mass for people with special needs that may be the first of many steps toward integrating participants more fully into the sacramental and social life of the parish.

Pregnancy Center Support

More than 3,000 pro-life pregnancy centers operate in K of C jurisdictions. Councils can "adopt" one of these centers that help pregnant women during pregnancy and following the birth of their newborn children and provide material, financial, labor and other support throughout the year.

Novena for Life

Knights are committed to defending the right to life of every human being from the moment of conception to natural death. Councils will promote a novena — nine days of prayer — to build up a culture of life in our parishes, homes and wider community. Knights and their families will come together in both public and private acts of prayer to promote the protection of life. ♦

Required Programs

In order to earn the Columbian Award, councils must conduct one required program from each program category. These four required programs are:

- Spiritual Reflection (Faith)
- Consecration to the Holy Family (Family)
- Helping Hands (Community)
- Novena for Life (Life)

Brother Norb Braza Notes on The Bible

The Bible is the number one book on the world's best seller list. This is what we should expect, since God is the author of the Bible.

God wanted to tell us about himself, and he did so through the written Word. God chose human authors and inspired them, that is, guided them to write what he wanted us to read. These authors were allowed to write in their own language, in their own style, and according to their own culture, but in all cases the words they wrote were God's words.

It took over 1000 years (about 900 BC to a little past 100 AD) for all the Sacred Books to be written. The Bible is not one book, but a collection of books. When we open the Bible, it's as if we are walking into a library. There are history books, love stories, prayers, poetry, short stories, prophecies, letters, and even debates. These books are divided into two major sections, the Old Testament and the New Testament. The 46 books of the Old Testament essentially tell us about God before the arrival of the Messiah. The 27 books of the New Testament contain the teachings of the Messiah himself.

There is no better way to enhance our knowledge of God than through the reading of the Word of God. Set aside some time for reading the Bible. BUT when you read it, do not read it as if you were reading some novel or textbook. Do not expect to read it from cover to cover. Choose a book. Learn the purpose of the human author; understand the culture of the times in which the book was written; try to place yourself in the time and place of the events and the minds of the participants; read it slowly; meditate on the meaning; and grow in love of God by applying the lessons to your everyday actions.

AJC TOP LOCAL STORY EXECUTION DRUG

Georgia AG fights drug company's attempt to stop Nevada execution

Alvogen filed lawsuit to prevent the use of sedative midazolam.

Georgia Attorney General Chris Carr submitted a brief last week in the case.

Nevada Supreme Court.

Thirty-one states, including Georgia, allow the death penalty.

Carr's office represents Georgia in death penalty appeals and is obligated under state law "to ensure that lawfully imposed sentences are carried out," said Katie McCreary, a spokeswoman Carr.

The other attorneys general who signed the brief are from Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, Idaho, Indiana, Louisiana, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Utah.

Carr also was one of 14 attorneys general who last week opposed delaying executions in a similar case involving executions in Nebraska. That case is pending in federal court.

Georgia Attorney General Chris Carr is opposing a drug company's effort to prevent its products from being used in executions.

Carr is one of 15 state attorneys general who submitted a brief last week in a Nevada death penalty lawsuit.

The drug company, Alvogen, sued to prevent the state of Nevada from using its sedative midazolam in its first execution since 2006, according to

The Associated Press.

The attorneys general called the lawsuit part of a "guerrilla war against the death penalty."

"If Alvogen is allowed to succeed, there is a substantial risk that pharmaceutical companies – prodded by anti-death penalty activists and the defense bar – will flood the courts with similar last-minute filings every time a state attempts to see justice done," states the brief submitted in the case before the

Georgia Ethics Watchdogs is Georgia's leading organization with the mission of holding local and state government entities and officials accountable to high ethical standards for the citizens of our state.

We serve as a resource for the public and media to set and promote standards of ethical conduct for our political leaders and candidates. When necessary, we act as the party responsible for filing ethics complaints, open records requests, complaints of open meeting violations or other instruments of rules or law that are set for holding public officials and candidates accountable for wrong-doing.

In partnership with our affiliated "Georgia Ethics Watchdogs Education Fund", we will train citizens to become effective government watchdogs at the level of government that they may be interested in holding accountable.



William Perry is the Top Dog at **Georgia Ethics Watchdogs**. He founded the organization in 2015 after serving almost five years as Executive Director of the public interest group **Common Cause Georgia**, as well as 22 years of experience working in government and campaigns, nonprofits and issue advocacy.

Perry was the seven-year Vice President of **Child Development and Domestic Operations for Pearson Perry Household, Inc.** (the stay-at-home dad industry) and credits the experience of raising children as the best possible training to prepare for dealing with politicians at all levels of government.

“Mass of Remembrance” October 16th

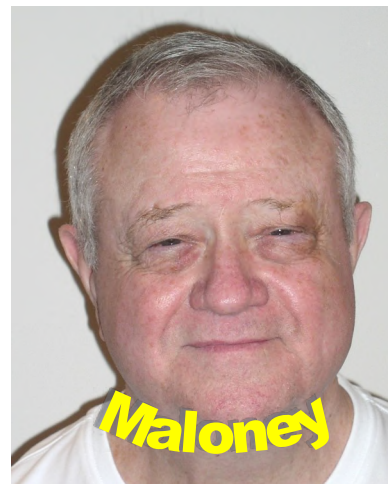

Council "Day of Reflection" Planning Begins

Our Council has begun planning for a "Day of Reflection" to be held on Saturday October 27th at All Saints.

The new "Faith in Action" initiative being spearheaded by Supreme (and detailed in this newsletter) mandates that each council sponsor such a reflection day event or a full member retreat as a component of its fraternal calendar every year. The avowed purpose of these changes is to get Catholics back to their religious roots and help strengthen parishes and families.

The format and guest speaker for this event is not yet finalized, but members will be provided more information after Labor Day. We expect that the council will use the software application "Sign Up Genius" to advise details and schedule members to attend.

If you study the list of suggested events outlined in the "Faith in Action" initiative guidelines, you will see a decided shift to a religious focus to complement (but not replace) the usual social and fundraising activities so common on all council calendars.

New!! Online KofC Membership

Capitalizing on the new online electronic gizmo generation, the Knights of Columbus has instituted a new online membership class of brother at the Supreme website portal KofC.Org/onlinemembership. No Form 100's.

Catholic men who are interested in becoming Knights, but feel they have only limited time or don't know what the extent of membership entails can sign up online in 5 minutes. After strict registration and annual payment of \$30 dues, they are actual full members of the Order with a membership degree of zero. They are not members of any council, but join a state division of membership providing them with our literature and full admittance to our insurance program. They are not provisional or partial members, but actual Knights without a council.

When a prospective member begins the Online Membership application process, the first step is for them to declare that they are: (1) a baptized Catholic male, (2) 18 years of age or older, and (3) a practical Catholic.

Once they check those boxes, and agree to abide by the laws and rules of the Knights of Columbus, they click "Proceed to Join" and proceed to the next page. They cannot continue if any of the boxes have not been checked.

Additionally, before they hit the "proceed to join" button, they are presented with the following message: "Failure to answer truthfully to any of these declarations, or failure to remain a practical Catholic in union with the Holy See, renders void your membership in the Knights of Columbus."

During the application process, applicants will need to provide the name of the parish they attend. There is a field to indicate if they would like to join a local council, and the opportunity to indicate their preferred council number if they have one. Both of these tools will generate reports and emails to facilitate the transition towards local council membership. (They will still need to be interviewed, vetted, and take a first degree to join a council.)

Once they have completed their registration, men who join the Order online will be given access to a web-based Online Membership portal and will begin receiving regular electronic communication from the Supreme Council. While they will receive a number of other benefits, the digital experience will form the core of their Knights of Columbus experience.

Content distributed to the member through the portal and direct communication will revolve around the four themes of: Lead with Faith, Protect Your Family, Serve Others and Defend Your Values.

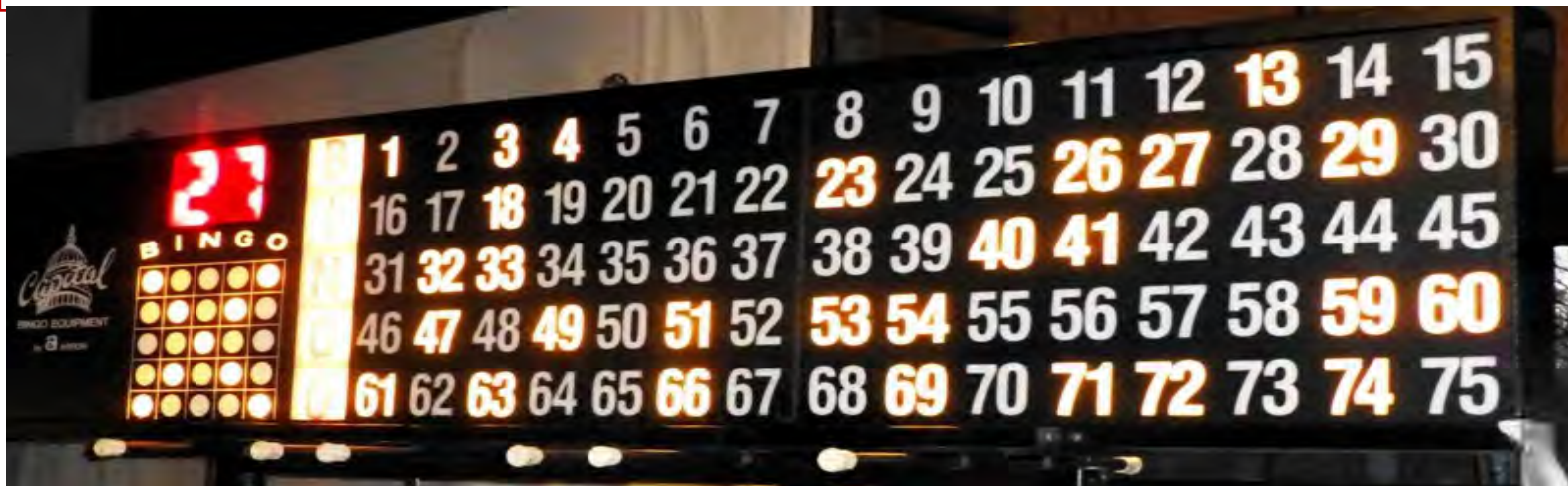
Through these four themes, these men will not only grow as individuals, but will become acclimated with the good work and rich history of the Knights of Columbus, thereby strengthening their affinity with the Knights of Columbus brand, and setting the stage for lifelong, active membership. They will also receive regular news updates from the Supreme Council, as well as news and event information from their State Council.

State division members who have joined online can transition to local council membership, just as members from other local councils do today. When a State Division member finds a local council he likes, he may deepen his involvement in the Knights of Columbus by converting his membership from his State Division into that local council to take his degrees. Since these members will not have taken the first degree, that ceremonial will be part of their transition to a local council.

A transition would be initiated by the local council's Financial Secretary. The receiving council would complete a Form 100 for "Transfer" after the First Degree and submit to the Supreme Council. After transitioning to a local council, the member would retain his online access to the Knights of Columbus membership experience, but cease paying his membership dues online, and instead begin to pay his local council's membership dues. The receiving council would receive the member's dues adjustment for the fraternal year.

This new fraternal program seeks to help the Order maintain sustainable long-term membership growth by providing the opportunity for membership throughout the modern man's life cycle. This streamlined alternative helps acclimate men to the Order. Once a man has joined online, we will then work to incorporate him into a council and get him fully integrated with its activities.

August Parish Bingo— Slow Night

Thankful for Priest's Kindness

Letter to the Editor, printed in *The Georgia Bulletin* June 21, 2018, (reprinted here against the wishes of Msgr. Marren.)

I had the privilege of working at this year's Eucharistic Congress assisting with the confessions the priest and our archdiocese offered to those attending. I have done this for several years now and I've always received special blessings as a result. However this particular Eucharistic Congress was especially moving for me.

With the help of our volunteers, I headed up the confessions being held at the south ballroom. The confessional lines were getting longer and longer, and we only had a few English-speaking priest at that point in the afternoon. I saw my pastor, Msgr. Hugh Marren, come through the door, and he saw our dilemma. Even though he was not signed up to hear confessions, he quickly came to our area and began to hear the confessions for those in line. He stayed for over two hours for which I was so grateful, but just to stain wasn't what made it such a beautiful blessing for me.

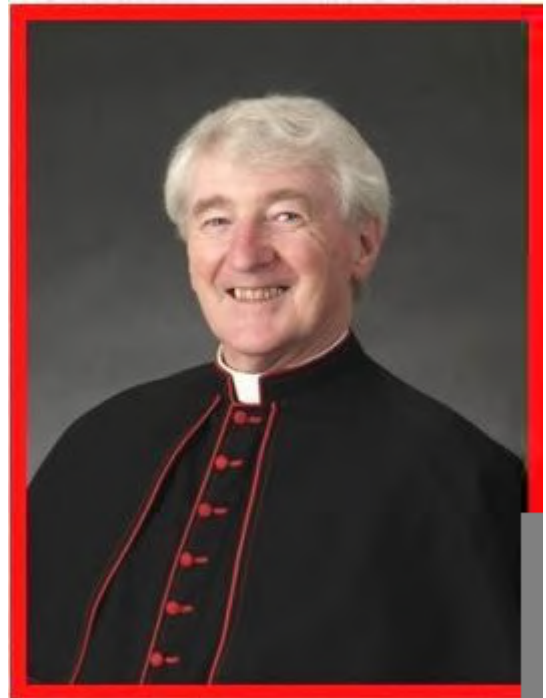
Standing in line for confession was a mother with her adult disabled son. She was having difficulty keeping control of him since he was almost 6 feet tall. Soon he was able to get away from her, and he wandered into the confessional area running up to all the priest who were hearing confessions and made noises. Our volunteers didn't know what to do to help without interfering with the privacy of the confessional. The mother grabbed him and sat down on one of the empty confessional chairs but he was pulling away again.

Then I saw the most amazing and beautiful thing take place. Monsignor Marren got up from his chair and walked directly over to the mother and her son, put his arms gently around the young man, and sat him down next to his mother. Monsignor calmly held the son's hand and drew him close while placing his other hand on the mother's head as he leaned over her and heard her confession. The young man never took his eyes off Monsignor Marren, and he was calm the entire time Monsignor Marren held them.

After a while, I saw the mother kneel down on her knees, as I can only imagine Monsignor was giving her absolution and a blessing. Tears were streaming down her face. It wasn't hard to see how grateful this mother was for Monsignor Marren's kindness. After the blessing, she stood up and hugged the priest. She and her son left the confession area and a peaceful, calm state. As Monsignor Marren returned to his chair, he turned and our eyes embraced for a few seconds as I mouthed the words, "thank you" with the tears welling up in my eyes. No one could deny the compassion this beautiful priest had for this family. I can tell you, all those waiting in the English-speaking line of confession wanted to go to Msgr. Marren, including the volunteers assisting the confession area.

Sometimes in our parishes we tend to forget or not to notice just how compassionate our priest can be. Our priests struggle with the same human frailties as the rest of us, but if we look carefully we can see them live as Christ asks us all to live. Our Lord teaches us that we must love one another as he loves us. We expect that our shepherds (priests) should love their flock, but we must also love our shepherds. We know the devil prowls around like a lion waiting to devour souls, and the souls Satan most seeks are our priests. They are under constant attack, so we must pray for them, help them, support them and thank them when they model the love of Christ as I witnessed that day.

Laus Deo

One detail that is seldom mentioned is that in Washington, D.C. there can never be a building of greater height than the Washington Monument.

With all the uproar about removing the Ten Commandments, etc., this is worth a moment or two of your time. I was not aware of this amazing historical information.

On the aluminum cap, atop the Washington Monument in Washington, D.C., are displayed two words: Laus Deo.

No one can see these words.

In fact, most visitors to the monument are totally unaware they are even there and for that matter, probably couldn't care less.

Once you know Laus Deo's history, you will want to share this with everyone you know.

These words have been there for many years; they are 555 feet, 5.125 inches high, perched atop the monument, facing skyward to the Father of our nation, overlooking the 69 square miles which comprise the District of Columbia, capital of the United States of America.

Laus Deo! Two seemingly insignificant, unnoticed words.

Out of sight and, one might think, out of mind, but very meaningfully placed at the highest point over what is the most powerful city in the most successful nation in the world.

So, what do those two words, in Latin, composed of just four syllables and only seven letters, possibly mean?

Very simply, they say 'Praise be to God!'

Though construction of this giant obelisk began in 1848, when James Polk was President of the United States, it was not until 1888 that the monument was inaugurated and opened to the public.

It took twenty-five years to finally cap the memorial with a tribute to the Father of our nation, Laus Deo, 'Praise be to God!'

From atop this magnificent granite and marble structure, visitors may take in the beautiful panoramic view of the city with its division into four major segments.

From that vantage point, one can also easily see the original plan of the designer, Pierre Charles L'Enfant a perfect cross imposed upon the landscape, with the White House to the north, The Jefferson Memorial is to the south, the Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

A cross you ask? Why a cross?

What about separation of church and state?

Yes, a cross; separation of church and state was NOT, is NOT, in the Constitution.

So, read on.

How interesting and, no doubt, intended to carry a profound meaning for those who bother to notice.

When the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid on July 4th, 1848 deposited within it were many items including the Holy Bible presented by the Bible Society. Praise be to God! Such was the discipline, the moral direction, and the spiritual mood given by the founder and first President of our unique democracy 'One Nation, Under God.'

I am awed by George Washington's prayer for America ... Have you ever read it? Well, now is your unique opportunity, so read on!

"Almighty God; We make our earnest prayer that Thou wilt keep the United States in Thy holy protection; that Thou wilt incline the hearts of the citizens to cultivate a spirit of subordination and obedience to government; and entertain a brotherly affection and love for one another and for their fellow citizens of the United States at large.

And finally that Thou wilt most graciously be pleased to dispose us all to do justice, to love MERCY, and to demean ourselves with that charity, humility, and pacific temper of mind which were the characteristics of the Divine Author of our blessed religion, and without a humble imitation of whose example in these things we can never hope to be a happy nation.

Grant our supplication, we beseech Thee, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

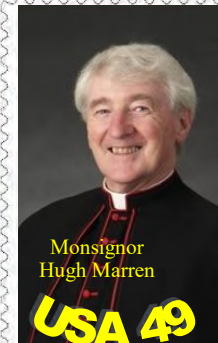
