This is the last XLT this year and we will monitor the lower parking lot traffic. Please try to come a bit earlier to avoid parking hassles. As you know, dues are being processed.

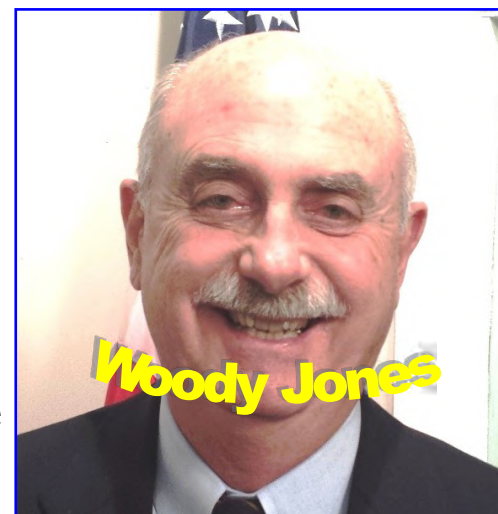

Brothers, I am looking for a **Program Chair for the Family Position**. We have people, I just need a Chairman. Please contact me for more information.

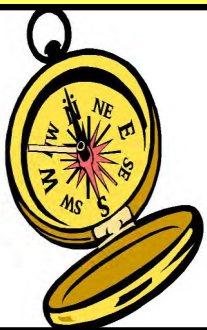
Brother Bryan Kler will need volunteers for the **State Free Throw Contest**. This year it will be held at All Saints Gym. The date is Sunday March 9th.

2018 Dues are Now Due (that's why they call them “Dues”)

Our council kc11402.org web site handles electronic payment of council dues. You go to that web site, choose “Pay Dues”, and you are connected to the PayPal system. You, of course, must have an active independent PayPal account already set up that is directed either to your check book or a credit card for debit purposes.

You may then pay your dues online for \$41.50 (which includes a \$1.50 electronic processing fee) by using your PayPal account to debit either a stated credit card or an amount directly out of your chosen checking account just like a debit card does.. Your personal PayPal account must be set up independently. There is a new second line choice that allows you to set up automatic \$41.50 PayPal payments for 5 years.

Of course, you may still pay your normal 2018 annual dues of \$40 directly at a meeting or send a \$40 check made out to “**KofC Council 11402**” to our Financial Secretary, Ralph O'Connor, at 390 17th St., NW, Unit 5069, Atlanta, GA 30363. His email is ralph390@comcast.net.

If a member is less than 26 years old on December 31, 2016, annual dues are only \$20. If you are a designated “Honorary” member (65 years old and a Knight for 25 consecutive years), your dues are only \$10. Priests, deacons, or members of a religious order pay no dues. Anyone who has been a Knight for 50 unbroken years likewise pays no dues. This year the Order has decided that Seminarians who join the Knights pay no dues as well.

These above rules are for Council 11402 dues only. Watters Assembly dues of \$30 are separate. We could not make it easier to pay your dues. Dues are assessed each January 1st. 2

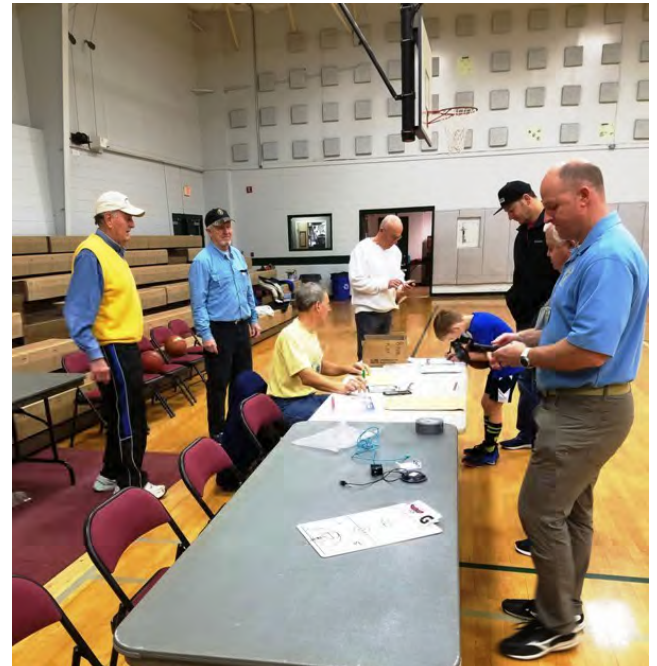


The January 13th event was successfully held at All Saints Gym and Youth Director Bryan Kler had several brothers assisting him. Here are some photos of the event.

During January the All Saints Parish Office decided to publicize the existence of the chapel at the rear of our church, because so many parishioners didn't know about it. They published the article below in the church bulletin and eNews email regarding the open house they would sponsor.

Have you wondered where the chapel is? What does it look like? What do you do there? What's an Adoration guardian? Is it for me?

Stop by before or after Mass on the 19th and 20th to check it out. (Chapel door will be opened and you will

see the chapel as you enter the front doors). No sign ups! We will have a few folks there to answer any questions.

Dana Litwack inquired of the Council if we knew any history of the chapel's origin to share with the parishioners who stopped in to visit it. She asked if it was true that the KofC had something to do with its beginning. She was supplied with lots of info.

It just so happened that the name of the chapel is "Our Lady, Queen of the Knights Chapel" and the council built it in 1999.

The project was submitted for a possible award and ended up winning an International Award over all 14,000 councils at the time. The award is on display in McGivney Hall. The Grand Knight whose name is on the award is Rick Sisko, who just passed away a couple of weeks ago.

Donations were collected to furnish the twelve kneeler chairs in the room. The name of each apostle is on one chair.

Sir Knight Sam Portis owned a construction company which did the beautiful paneling work. Archbishop Donaghue was on hand to dedicate it.

The Knights of Columbus, Council 11402, built Our Lady Queen of the Knights Chapel at All Saint's Catholic Church. Late in 1997 Monsignor R. Donald Kiernan, Pastor at All Saints, asked the Knights to build a place for quiet prayer and meditation to replace the makeshift chapel located in the church's cry room.

George Novac took on the project as chairman in July 1998. George put together a committee consisting of Richard Holcomb handling fund raising, Robert Greene overseeing interior decorating and design, and Sam Portis as general contractor for the project. The small religious articles store in the vestibule of the Church was converted into a beautiful 400 square-foot chapel. Behind a clear stained glass door with a cross and red trim, the chapel has a new altar, paneling and chairs of cherry wood named after the 12 apostles. Panel lights installed above the crucifix, altar and baptismal font provide various levels of light.

The Knights of Council 11402 completely financed the \$27,000 plus project with, among other contributions, various members paying \$1,000 for memorial plaques on the altar, crucifix and chairs.

Our Lady Queen of the Knights Chapel was opened in late 1998 and was dedicated in a solemn ceremony February 8, 1999 by Archbishop John F. Donoghue. The chapel is available for prayer whenever the church is open and is used for weekly exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. It is also used for baptisms, weddings and Mass for small groups. Project chairman, George Novac's grandson was the first person to be baptized in the new chapel.

Council 11402 received the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council International Award for a church activity, State Council recognition and a big thank you from the parishioners at All Saints for a job well done.

Mr. Herb Broughton, immediate Past State Secretary gave an introduction and short review of the chapel construction project. His comments brought forth words of a job well done.

Trappist monks ordained as transitional deacons amid joy of Advent

CONYERS—Advent is the season during which we await the coming of the Lord. It is a time we are asked to prepare for his arrival by taking to heart the need to repent of our sinfulness and rejoice: God has blessed us with the gift of his Son. And through this gift we are sharers in the eternal joy that is divine life.

Normally, we monks try and do the best we can to maintain the discipline that is asked of us during Advent. Basically, that means a change of pace, color and a more focused frame of mind at the [Monastery of the Holy Spirit](#). We try to be watchful regarding the momentum of each day, allowing it as much as we can to be slow enough so that we can better absorb the meanings given us in the readings from Scripture, our daily round of Offices and our daily celebration of the Eucharist. Our Advent wreath stands in our church aisle, its purple and rose candles gradually lit, one after another, with each successive week of the Advent cycle. Our vestments are purple, too, and are quite beautiful. All of this helps us and our guests better focus on all that Advent has to offer us, not least being the importance of waiting, waiting for what is truly good for us.

During this recent Advent, something different and quite wonderful took place. You might say that the Lord revealed his love and presence to us through two very special men—men who have already shown a willingness to share their gifts with us in their years at the monastery.

Brothers Cassian Russell and Peter Damian Spera were ordained to the Order of Deacon in our Abbey Church on Dec. 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Mother. Bishop Bernard E. Shlesinger III conferred upon them the Order of Deacon. It was a beautiful ceremony. Cassian and Peter are no strangers to the call or service, which was officially conferred upon them through the call of the church to serve as deacons.

Cassian is our sub-prior and is a great help to Abbot Augustine Myslinski. He also serves as master of novices and is of invaluable help to the Cistercian Lay Associates at the monastery.

Peter has worn many hats here, and has done so gladly and willingly. He presently serves the community as a cook. He also finds time to help in the Abbey Store and has previously helped the sick in the infirmary.

Peter and Cassian both serve as well on various committees that keep this community healthy and afloat. Peter gives of his talents to our Monastic Schola, which is demanding more time than usual these days since we are in the process of changing all of our music to that chanted by the monks of Gethsemani in Kentucky.

So the gift that is Christmas came, in part, a bit ahead of time this year. And it was a very festive and joy-filled arrival. We set a day apart and celebrated the ongoing journey of two monks, two brothers, two friends. And, to our added delight, there is more to come. God is good. God is generous. God holds good things in store for those who wait.

And so we shall wait, wait for June when the bells will ring once again, and Peter Damian and Cassian will be ordained to the priesthood. That day will be like the joy of a Christmas Day in the June of a Georgia summer.

New Rules for Golfers Over 60 Years Old

We have just been alerted that the USGA has alerted golf rules for players over 60 years of age. These rules are considered simple common sense changes that should have always been in place anyway. Please study and begin using them immediately.

2019 RULE CHANGES IN EFFECT FOR GOLFERS AGE 60+

Rule 9.k.34(a): If a tree is between the ball and the hole, and the tree is deemed to be younger than the player, then the ball can be moved without penalty.. This is so because this is simply a question of timing; when the player was younger, the tree was not there, so the player is being penalized because of his age.

Rule 1.a.5 - A ball sliced or hooked into the Rough shall be lifted and placed on the Fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the Rough with no penalty. The senior player should not be penalized for tall grass which ground keepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d.6 (B) - A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed NOT to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have traveled if it had not hit the tree, and play the ball from there.

Rule 3.B.3(G) - There shall be no such thing as a lost ball. The missing ball is on or near the course and will eventually be found and pocketed by someone else, thereby making it a stolen ball. The senior player is not to compound the felony by charging himself with a penalty.

Rule 4.c.7(h) - If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The Law of Gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf.

Rule 5. - Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in, may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the Hole. No one wants to make a mockery of the game.

Rule 6.a.9(k) - There is no penalty for so-called “out of bounds.” If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior player deserves an apology, not a penalty.

Rule 7.G.15(z) - There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as golf balls should float. Senior players should not be penalized for any shortcomings of the manufacturers.

Rule 8.k.9(S) - Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior players, one-half stroke per hole may be subtracted for using old equipment.

Please advise all your senior friends of these important rule changes and keep multiple copies in your golf bag. Those not following the rules need to be provided a copy.

Helping Our Older Brothers Reminisce

Born in the 1930s and early 40s, we exist as a very special age cohort. We are the Silent Generation.

We are the smallest number of children born since the early 1900s. We are the "last ones."

We are the last generation, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the impact of a world at war which rattled the structure of our daily lives for years.

We are the last to remember ration books for everything from gas to sugar to shoes to stoves.

We saved tin foil and poured fat into tin cans.

We saw cars up on blocks, because tires weren't available.

We can remember milk being delivered to our house early in the morning and placed in the milk box on the porch. (by my Dad & sometime by me.)

We are the last to see the gold stars in the front windows of our grieving neighbors whose sons died in the War.

We saw the 'boys' home from the war, build their little houses.

We are the last generation who spent childhood without television; instead, we imagined what we heard on the radio.

As we all like to brag, with no TV, we spent our childhood "playing outside"

We did play outside, and we did play on our own.

There was no little league.

There was no city playground for kids.

The lack of television in our early years meant, for most of us, that we had little real understanding of what the world was like.

On Saturday afternoons, the movies, gave us newsreels of the war sandwiched in between westerns and cartoons.

Telephones were one to a house, often shared (party Lines) and hung on the wall.

Computers were called calculators, they only added and were hand cranked; typewriters were driven by pounding fingers, throwing the carriage, and changing the ribbon.

The internet and GOOGLE were words that did not exist.

Newspapers and magazines were written for adults and the news was broadcast on our table radio in the evening by Gabriel Heatter.

We are the last group who had to find out for ourselves.

The G.I. Bill gave returning veterans the means to get an education and spurred colleges to grow.

VA loans fanned a housing boom.

The veterans joined civic clubs and became active in politics.

The radio network expanded from 3 stations to thousands of stations

We played by ourselves until the street lights came on.

Depression poverty was deep rooted.

Polio was still acrippler.

The Korean War was a dark presage in the early 50s and by mid-decade school children were ducking under desks for Air-Raid training.

We came of age in the 40s and 50sThe war was over and the cold war, terrorism, global warming , and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life with unease.

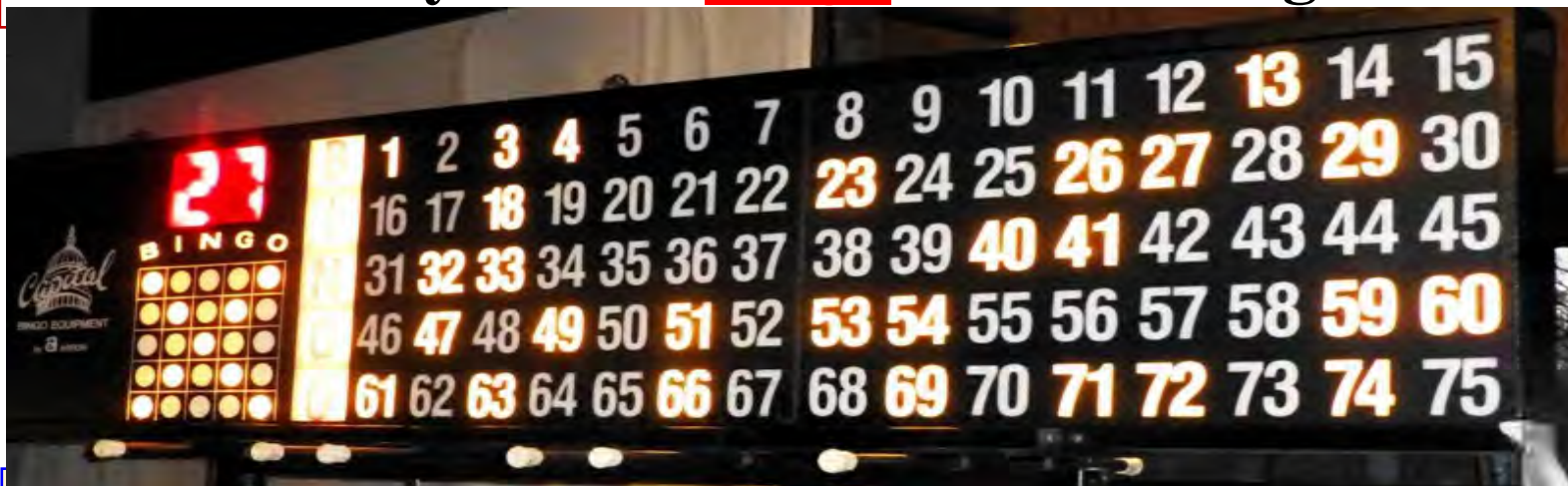

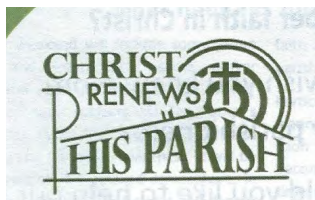
